On November 24, 2017, just one day after Thanksgiving, AWL humane agents received and responded to a call about a dog tied to a tree in the middle of a wooded area in Warren. It's unknown how long the dog had been left out there as he had just become visible to a nearby business due to the season change and leaves falling from the trees. Agents had to search the area but eventually found a very



emaciated but very sweet dog that seemed to have simply been abandoned in the woods.

Upon arrival at AWL, this dog was examined by AWL staff and was undoubtedly given the name Forest. Not only was he severely underweight but he also had open wounds on his legs and scabs from healing wounds near his neck and face. It was apparent that Forest not only needed veterinary treatment but some extra TLC was also in order.

After a few weeks of wholesome food, good antibiotics and wound care, Forest was ready to make his debut on the adoption floor. It didn't take long for someone to fall in love with the sweet face and loving demeanor that Forest had to offer. On December 26, one day after Christmas, Tyler and Chelsi wanted to give Forest the second chance he so very deserved. They adopted, brought him home, and Forest has never looked back!

Since being with his new family, Forest has gained over 20 lb. and is finally at a healthy 71 lb.! Tyler stated, "Slowly but surely, his wounds healed, his coat shined and his weight returned. He was zooming around the house in no time!" Forest has completed obedience classes and loves going to the dog park and socializing with other dogs. Tyler and Chelsi said that Forest loves peanut butter and sleeping



under the covers in bed. He also

gets a Bark Box every month! Tyler stated, "It can be difficult at times caring for a rescue dog and their special needs, but the love and loyalty you receive in return make it worth every second."

# HOARDING

**KISS** (Keep It Simple Stupid) is a useful guideline when making a sales presentation. But life is very complex, and messy.

**Until very recently,** hoarding behavior was barely studied. But the Hoarding of Animals Research Consortium (HARC) collaborated from 1997-2006 "to define and better understand the problem of animal hoarding.... and ... its sentinel role for elder abuse and neglect, child abuse and neglect, and adult selfneglect." (Tufts University, Cummings School of Veterinary Medicine website. At the same website, see "Animal Hoarding: a Neglected Problem at the Intersection of Psychiatry, Veterinary Medicine, and Law – Findings from the Henderson House Workgroup.")

Findings of HARC include the following: "... poorly understood phenomenon. The majority of cases satisfied criteria for adult self-neglect.... Hoarding behavior in humans ... is associated with a variety of psychological conditions, particularly obsessive-compulsive disorder.... This public health problem knows no social or economic boundaries....(The results of two recent studies: 83.1 percent were women.... The total number of animals... per case ranged from 10 to 918. The mean and median ... were 55.8 and 47 respectively, for men and 90.1 and 50, respectively, for women. Women ... were more likely than men ... to have more than 100 animals....Nearly three-quarters ... were single, widowed, or divorced....The hoarders' justification...varied....Although love for animals was a ubiquitous theme, the role of animals as children or surrogate family members was also common."

"In a typical case, household interiors were coated, often several inches high, with human and animal urine and feces, sometimes to an extent that the floors buckled. When animal control or humane society agents entered these homes ... the contamination and toxic atmosphere sometimes made it necessary to wear protective clothing and a breathing apparatus."

See also TuftsNow - The Hoarding Gene, by Nicholas Dodman, May 24, 2013. "The shoes, newspapers or other items that hoarders collect can eventually take over their homes. Some people have even been crushed to death when towering piles of their collectibles have fallen on them.... (T)he tendencies that lead to such situations may have evolutionary roots. We are hunter-gatherers....It shows up in the animal world: while there are many examples of animals whose gathering is functional and adaptive - squirrels burying nuts for the winter, for instance - irrational gathering goes on, too. Cats of the short-legged Munchkin breed, for example, collect jewelry and small shiny objects and do little with their stashes. And certain mice compulsively bury marbles."

"In our work on Doberman pinschers, my colleagues and I have begun to uncover clues to the mechanisms behind hoarding in animals. The results may help researchers understand hoarding in humans."

"In one revealing study, we focused on a bizarre behavior called flank sucking. An affected Doberman will put its open mouth on its flank, clamp down softly and ... begin sucking.... (F) lank suckers also have a strong penchant for gathering, mouthing and ingesting non-food substances." "Granted, many dogs do such things, but these Dobermans do them persistently and compulsively, in much the way that humans suffering from obsessive-compulsive disorder might repeatedly wash their hands."

**"They fetishize a wide variety** of materials, including fabrics (blankets, socks, toy stuffing, sneakers and crate pads), organic matter (dirt, leaves, branches and twigs), paper products (sheets of paper, paper towels, cardboard, dryer sheets, cotton-tipped swabs and cigarette butts), plastic and vinyl (toys, jump drives, cell phones, pagers, pens, electric toothbrushes, shavers, eyeglasses and remote controls) and metal (nuts, bolts and keys).... Doberman owners call this behavior "shopping."

"After much searching, we have found the flank-sucking/shopping gene, neurocadherin, on canine chromosome seven. This gene sheds light on the biological pathways that may be involved in compulsive collecting. That, in turn, could help scientists develop new treatments for both dogs and humans."

"For both us and our pets, behaviors that once staved off death now do nothing more than bring short-lived relief from stress. They've become a driving force to spin our biological wheels. If we did not live in the concrete jungle of modern life, we might never have developed our compulsions in the first place."

**Chromosome seven.** Huh. How about that. (Judge not, lest ye be judged.)

# **EXCITED TO ANNOUNCE**

We are so excited to announce that we have teamed up with Jenny Falvey and her team from Dogsmartz Unleashed to offer dog training, obedience and behavior classes here at the AWL! To get your dog(s) signed up, please call Dogsmartz Unleashed at 330-707-4160. They will be handling all of the scheduling and can answer further questions about what each class entails. You can also visit their website for more information as well. www.dogsmartzunleashed.com

Jenny and another trainer for Dogsmartz Unleashed, Heather Huff, have also been overseeing both of our dog training programs, the Caring Companion Program and the Dogs in Prison Program, which are held at Trumbull Correctional Institute. Through a joint venture with TCI, six dogs are selected every nine weeks to enter each program and live with inmates. Each dog is assigned to two inmate handlers who teach the dogs basic obedience, crate training and house training during the animal's stay. Approximately three weeks prior to entering the training, AWL staff begins to select dogs for the program and pinpoint dogs with behavior issues such as poor leash behaviors or jumping that they feel will benefit from the program. Once selected for the program, the dogs can be pre-adopted by potential families and at the end of the nine-week training, the adoption is finalized and adopters are able to take their newly trained pet home. The adoption fee for a prison trained dog is \$200. The pet will be current on all applicable vaccines including rabies, current on heartworm-flea/tick prevention, is spayed/ neutered, and will be microchipped with the registration of the new owner's information. # **Notes FROM THE Executive Director**

### Kent State University Vet Tech Program

This is an exciting time to be at the Animal Welfare League. Our building has 47,000 square feet, but only about half of it has been finished for use. Most of the unfinished portion has been tentatively earmarked for use by the Kent State University veterinary technician program, which for various reasons did not progress until the first week in June, when Kent State announced a firm partnership with AWL. Now it is full steam ahead into the future.

KSU vet tech students have been holding some classes here since late 2013. The state-of-the-art

enhancement will provide a joint use medical and surgical area, including a laboratory, a recovery and treatment area, a radiology room and a pharmacy, all of which will be completed for use by the beginning of the fall term on August 23. A multi-use educational center will follow. Students will now complete their clinical requirements at AWL. "The partnership we have with the AWL really sets our program apart," said Melissa Best,



program coordinator. KSU signage will appear in addition to existing AWL signage. About 40 students are enrolled in the Associate Degree of Applied Science in Veterinary Technology degree program.

The National Association of Veterinary Technicians in America (NAVTA) is promoting the title "veterinary nurse" in place of vet tech, in recognition of the high level of medical expertise that this profession provides, and because it more accurately reflects the nature of their responsibilities. ### Charitable Giving is Down (HELP !!)

The Associated Press recently reported that "for 2017, giving by individuals represented 2 percent of total disposable income - down from 2.4 percent in 2002 and the same as in 1978. Similarly, total charitable donations have hovered around 2 percent of the gross domestic product for many years; for 2017 that was 2.1 percent.... (T)he percentage of U.S. households making donations has declined steadily in recent years, from about 67 percent in 2000 to 56.6 percent in 2015." 6/13/2018

Changes in tax laws that affect the deduction for charitable donations could further hurt charitable giving. The Tax Policy Center projects reductions from 37 million households to 16 million in 2018, and the Council on Foundations projects annual reductions of \$16 billion.

See your tax advisor regarding tax-smart charitable giving strategies such as charitable gift annuities, bunching of deductions in alternate tax years, donor advised funds and tax-free transfers from an IRA.

foster homes. AWL at times receives nursing mother cats as well as orphaned baby kittens. Our foster volunteers are essential in keeping these animals healthy and thriving by taking them out of the shelter environment and into their homes temporarily. The length of time cats and kittens need in a foster home depends on their age and condition but is usually about two to eight weeks as kittens need to be healthy and a minimum of 2.5 pounds before they can be spayed or neutered. AWL takes responsibility for all veterinary care and can provide the basic needs of care. By becoming a foster, you can help these homeless cats and kittens in need by housing and caring for them until they are healthy enough to be placed for adoption and find their permanent homes. # COME HAVE YOUR BIRTHDAY PARTY AT THE AVIMAL WELFARE LEAGUE!

Imagine gathering with your friends in the pet store and opening gifts right in front of the cat showcases. For early arrivals, there are blanket games, books, and a place to put your shelter donations. Once all have arrived and gifts have been opened by the birthday person, the group is led downstairs to a room which has already been decorated by the family, who also brought whatever foods and drinks they wanted.

Depending upon the pre-planned schedule, the party continues with food, drinks, and cake OR the birthday party people gather for an educational program to learn about the shelter, to practice safety and dog bite prevention techniques, and to learn about caring for family pets. The first "game" is a Scavenger Hunt while on the shelter tour to find everything from the dog bathing area to the new construction site. Depending on time, there are team games to play such as human tic-tac-toe, animal relays, shelter charades, and more!

Can you imagine having a party at AWL? There is a choice of four options at various prices for the party packages offered at AWL. There are two differentsized rooms available with tables and chairs provided. **The Pet Awareness Class (PAC)** program has been educating students and adults for about 3 years now! The wall along the ramp leading to the downstairs level of the building displays the four words that make up AWL's Mission Statement: Rescue, Rehabilitate, Adopt, and Educate. This instructional PAC program supports the "Educate" portion of that Mission Statement.

It is never too early to teach children to be compassionate and caring for animals while still being safe. Young children who become members of the Pup Club enjoy a session that includes a fingerplay with a song to help them remember when to keep their fingers to themselves while giving animals their personal space. Preschooolers through second graders practice what to do when a strange and possibly dangerous dog approaches as well as how to safely greet a dog that is new to them. Basic ways to keep a family pet happy and healthy are learned through an age-appropriate lesson that encourages participation. After the 35-40 minute program, children receive a coloring book containing pages to remind them of the lesson as well as a keychain with the PAC logo.

Students in grades 3 – 8 become participants of the Member Club when they complete a PAC program lasting 45 -60 minutes. Besides all the basic ideas from the younger class, this group learns dog body language and some of the ways dogs communicate their feelings to humans. Being aware of a pet's needs and sometimes fears makes a wonderful pet owner! Responsible pet ownership cannot be learned at too young of a grade level! The older students discuss some hot topic items such as the importance of spaying and neutering, and the need for laws to protect animals. Students in the Member Club receive a workbook containing fun pages to reinforce the ideas presented in the class. They also get a PAC logo keychain.

**These two programs are the most often** presented at schools that request a visit or to school classes, Scouts, and 4-H groups that come to the shelter. 



# The Vicissitudes of Communication

I have previously written about pit bulls and breed specific legislation in Ohio. The Supreme Court of Ohio requires that criminal laws that govern dangerous or vicious dogs can only apply on a dog by dog basis, and cannot apply to an entire breed. The "breed" in question that has prompted multiple prosecutions throughout Ohio is the pit bull. Sometimes animal law convictions are overturned because of vague or contradictory wording in statutes or ordinances. (There's an old joke among lawyers that just as you wouldn't want to see how sausage is made, you wouldn't want to see how laws are drafted and passed.) Careful drafting is especially important in criminal law, due to the serious consequences of a conviction.

This issue is further complicated by the fact that pit bulls are not a recognized breed in the first place. It is a grouping of several breeds viz., the American Staffordshire Terrier, the American Pit Bull Terrier, and the Staffordshire Bull Terrier, or any dog with a majority of the physical traits of any of these three. As a practical matter, in the enforcement of statutory and municipal ordinance regulation of "pit bulls", disagreements often arose among law enforcement officials, veterinarians and dog owners with regard to whether the dog in question was actually a pit bull. Clearly, reasonably believing that your dog is not a pit bull should not place you in jeopardy of violating pit bull regulations.

Questionable language in any legal document, including legislation, contracts, deeds, wills, trust agreements, and articles of incorporation, probably leads to litigation more than any other single cause. But fuzzy communication is problematic in life in general.

The three day Civil War battle of Gettysburg was pivotal. Ambiguous and conflicting orders got the Confederacy off to a bad start near the beginning. General Robert E. Lee had ordered his commanders to avoid a general engagement until his scattered army could bring a more concentrated force against Union troops. Imagine Confederate General Richard S. Ewell's consternation when he was also ordered to attack certain high ground "if possible" and then later "if practicable." He did not attack, and never heard the end of it.

Consider next the Civil War battle of Raymond, Mississippi, part of General Grant's campaign to capture Vicksburg (which is still taught at West Point). As Union and Confederate forces maneuvered against one another, Confederate General John Pemberton ordered Col. William Adams to direct his cavalry "there" (meaning Raymond) to scout the area and keep General John Gregg informed about Union troop movements. Adams interpreted "there" to mean "your cavalry that are there" (all five of them). He realized too late that he was meant to take the entire regiment that he had with him "to Raymond". Depends on your definition of "there."

Normally, when lawyers and legislators draft ambiguously, large numbers of casualties and lost wars do not result. Just lost millions of dollars and questionable prosecutions.

Pity the poor comma. (Well, it did have a cameo appearance in The English Patient, which won the Academy Award for Best Picture of 1996.) Abused and unused. Seemingly destined to be a punctuation relic, it just won't flush. Hmmmm. I guess that's because we need it. The following three cases are good examples of very preventable drafting errors, and their very expensive consequences.

## Rogers Communications v Bell Aliant, 2007 [\$888,000 (\$ 1,000,000 Canadian)]

"This agreement shall be effective from the date it is made and shall continue in force for a period of five (5) years from the date it is made, and thereafter for successive five (5) year terms, unless and until terminated by one year prior notice in writing by either party."

A regulator held that the purpose of the second comma (before unless) was to apply the one year notification to both the initial and subsequent five year terms. Rogers argued it applied only to renewals, and "... commissioned a 69-page affidavit, mostly about commas, from Kenneth A. Adams, a lawyer from Garden City, N.Y., who is the author of two books on contract language. It disputes the regulator's analysis of what Mr. Adams calls "the rule of the last antecedent." See "The Comma That Costs 1 Million Dollars" by Ian Austen, New York Times 10/25/2006.

## Medfusion, Inc. v Allscripts Healthcare Solutions, Inc., 2015 [\$4,000,000]

"in no event shall either party be liable for any loss or damage to revenues, profits, or goodwill or other special, incidental, indirect, or consequential damages of any kind, resulting from its performance or failure to perform under this agreement ..."

Medfusion sued for lost profits and revenues, which Allscripts argued were barred. Medfusion countered that "or other ... consequential damages" modifies revenue, profits and goodwill, all of which are excluded only if they are consequential or indirect.

#### O'Connor v Oakhurst Dairy, 2017 [\$10,000,000]

Maine overtime pay statute 26 MRSA Sec. 664 (3) exempts certain jobs, viz., "The canning, processing, preserving, freezing, drying, marketing, storing, packing for shipment or distribution of: (1) Agricultural produce; (2) Meat and fish products; and (3) Perishable foods"

Truck drivers sued for back pay, arguing that without a comma after "shipment", the exemption was meant to only apply to those persons who pack, for either shipment or distribution. Since they only drive, and driving was not included, they are not exempted and so are entitled to overtime. Ambiguous? Yes, but in labor cases, the general rule is that the ambiguity is resolved in favor of the workers.

(Which reminds me of an old Ohio statutory rape case, in which the key language in the statute was "not over the age of 16." Applying the rule of interpretation of criminal statutes that provides that ambiguous language in resolved in favor of the defendant, the court reversed the conviction, holding that you are over 16 the day after your 16th birthday. Curiously, a court in another county applied a different rule of statutory construction: ambiguous language is given its ordinary, everyday meaning, held that not over 16 means not having yet attained age 17, and sent that defendant to prison.)

In case you are ever on Double Jeopardy, and the topic is "commas", the commas in question in the above cases are known as Oxford or serial commas. The legislative style guide for the State of Maine, the AP, and the New York Times generally discourage their use, except where appropriate to avoid ambiguity. The Chicago Manual of Style and the Oxford University Press encourage it, for the same reason.
