RECENT ANIMAL LAW DEVELOPMENTS

Pit bull dogs are a very popular breed, despite their reputation as dangerous, vicious animals. That reputation has prompted some states and municipalities to enact breed specific legislation that prohibits their ownership. Breed specific legislation has often been successfully challenged across the country as unsupportable by the evidence, and effective May 22, 2012, Ohio's vicious dog statute was amended to repeal the automatic inclusion of a pit bull, and to instead focus on the specific behavior of any dog, with regard to whether it meets this definition of vicious: a dog that without provocation has killed or caused serious injury to any person, unless it is a police dog that was assisting police, or was a dog that killed or

caused serious injury to a person who was committing or attempting to commit a trespass or other criminal offense on the property of the owner, keeper or harborer of the dog. The terms "dangerous" dog and "vicious" dog are defined by Ohio statutes, and the determination is made on a case by case basis.

Nevertheless, until the challenge recently of a Reynoldsburg ordinance, some municipalities believed that they had the option under Ohio home rule statutes to continue to outlaw breeds. That argument was struck down by the Licking County Court of Appeals on April 19, 2017, and the issue is now likely put to rest in all of Ohio. - Article by Gary Pilcher

WOULD YOU LIKE TO ADOPT AN ALREADY TRAINED DOG? The Animal Welfare

League's Caring Companion Program, which kicked-off in 1999, can now boast that it has successfully adopted 100s of dogs to happy owners. Through a joint venture with Trumbull County Corrections Institute, six dogs are selected every nine weeks to enter the program and live with inmates. Each dog is assigned to two inmate handlers where they teach the dogs basic obedience, crate training and house training during the animal's stay. Approximately three weeks prior to entering the training, AWL staff begin to select dogs for the program, such as those that are shy or timid, and those with issues such as jumping or poor leash behavior. Once selected for the program, the dogs can be pre-adopted by potential homes and at the end of the nine-week training, the adoption is finalized and adopters are able to take their newly trained pet home. The adoption fee for a prison trained dog is \$200. The pet will be current on all applicable vaccines including rabies, current on heartworm-flea/tick prevention, is spayed/ neutered, and the dog will be microchipped with the registration information of the new owner. Welcome to the Family BY GARY PILCHER



Over the past 20 years courts and legislatures have substantially departed from the notion of animals as mere property, in response to overwhelming evidence of bonds between humans and other animals that is on a par with intra human bonding, and, in recognition of very compelling evidence that many animals are surprisingly sentient, emotional, intelligent, human-like beings. Animal law courses are now common in law schools, and animal law practice is on the rise. Many bar associations have animal law committees. Animal law seminars abound. Estate plans now include enforceable arrangements for the ongoing care of pets after the death of the owner. Divorce actions now include pet custody rights, including the adjudication of what is in the best interests of the pet!! How cool is that! (See "In a first, Alaska divorce courts will now treat pets more like children" by Karin Brulliard, Washington Post, 1-24-17):

"It is significant," said David Favre, a Michigan State University law professor who specializes in animal law. "For the first time, a state has specifically said that a companion animal has visibility in a divorce proceeding beyond that of property – that the court may award custody on the basis of what is best for the dog, not the human owners."

"The relationship with the animal is what is important in the family law context, so the property law analysis tends to be a poor fit for resolving disputes, and in fact, many of the property settlement agreements are continuously disputed, making more work for the courts," according to Kathy Hessler, director of the Animal Law Clinic at Lewis and Clark College in Portland, Oregon." "It makes more sense to address these issues at the legislative level to allow for public input and create rules that can be applied evenly to all citizens."

"The Alaska bill also allows courts to include pets in domestic violence protective orders...."

The animal law committee of the OSBA recently posted "Jury awards \$1.26 M to Glen Burnie family whose dog was shot by police" (a Maryland case), noting that Ohio is still a statutory market value of personal property state, as recently as 2014-Ohio-3277. But these days, 2014 can quickly become ancient history in animal law.

In 2015 the Nonhuman Rights Project sought a writ of habeas corpus in New York to free two research chimps, Hercules and Leo, an action that was backed by noted legal scholar Laurence Tribe of Harvard Law School, who emphasized that this was not an attempt to characterize chimps as humans,

but to recognize them as "autonomous beings, who are self-aware and self-directed," and therefore arguably entitled to the protection of some sort of habeas-like order.

And that is the crux of the matter. Instead of getting hopelessly entangled in semantic arguments about humans, human-like, semi-people, property, and so on, the analysis should be, "OK, this is what we now know. These are the interests at stake. Now, what are we going to do? What arrangements can we provide to suitably address widespread legitimate concerns?" The Nonhuman Rights Project posited that Hercules and Leo were "too cognitively and emotionally complex to be held in captivity and should be relocated to an established chimpanzee sanctuary". Why should that be alarming? As Mark Joseph Stern wrote in the New York Times (July 31, 2015 "Judge Denies Legal Personhood to Chimps - for Now"), quoting the judge in the case (Barbara Jaffe), "Jaffe takes this claim seriously ... by repeatedly citing the Supreme Court's decisions broadening the rights of liberty for gay Americans. 'If rights were defined by who exercised them in the past,' she notes, quoting Obergefell v Hodges, 'then received practices could serve as their own continued justification and new groups could not invoke rights once denied.' Moreover, chimps are undeniably humanlike in many ways: Humans and chimps share almost 99 percent of their DNA, as well as similar brain structure and cognitive development. ... They may not be human - but they aren't totally inhuman."

Now comes Naruto, a crested macague monkey, which knowingly and purposefully snapped an adorable selfie of himself. PETA asserted that the monkey owned the copyright to the photo, not the photographer whose camera was used, because copyrights go to the photographer, not the owner of the camera, and in this case the photographer was the monkey. The owner was David Slater, a professional photographer on a mission to a nature reserve, who left the camera unattended long enough for Naruto to grin into the lens and snap the selfie. The lawsuit was settled before the circuit court ruled on an appeal: "PETA and David Slater agree that this case raises important, cutting-edge issues about expanding legal rights for non-human animals, a goal that they both support, and they will continue their respective work to achieve this goal." Slater agreed to donate 25% of future profits to charitable organizations that protect Naruto, in Indonesia.



OUR NEW HUMANE AGENTS

In Ohio humane agents are responsible for enforcing the criminal laws against animal abuse and neglect. (Other law enforcement officers, such as municipal police, also have this responsibility, of course.) This can be very dangerous, as when dealing with persons who promote dog fighting. At the other extreme, some persons just need to be nudged in the right direction. Examples of this include conversing with persons whose animals need better shelter arrangements in frigid or sweltering hot weather. So, a good humane agent must be able to operate across a wide spectrum of circumstances, from physical aggression and arrest at one end, to social worker-like persuasion at the other. We believe Dr. Harold "Buzz" Firster and Rich Holzhauser fit this profile. They were sworn in by the probate judge on September 5.

A LETTER FROM THE Executive Director

Living with animals!! I can't imagine life without them. They are endlessly entertaining, interesting, and comforting. The guintessential stress reliever. And sometimes, life-saver. The friends who like you despite your shortcomings. The daily reminders of what is right with the world. Gandhi is famous for saying that you can judge a society by the way it treats its animals. (You can never go wrong by quoting Gandhi.) The Prophet Muhammad is said to have cut his robe with a pair of scissors rather than disturb a cat who had fallen asleep on part of it. Cat lovers especially can relate to the Prophet's resolution of his dilemma – we remain immobilized on the couch long after both of our legs have gone numb and our kidneys are about to burst, rather than disturb a cat that has fallen asleep on our lap. It's the law. Dog ate your new couch while you were at work? Oh well, dogs will be dogs. (And now you have a great story to tell everyone, which you can't wait to do!) Cat knock all the ornaments off the tree? Oh well, cats will be cats. [I tell new cat owners that everything in their home falls into at least one of five categories: food, a toy, a litter box, a bed, or a scratch-post. Everything. Including your body parts.]

I consider myself to be especially lucky to spend most of every day with animals – my pets at home, and my flock of rescued animals at our shelter, some of which I sneak into my office during hours that we are closed to the public. My room is equipped a large dog bed, a litter box, toys, and food and water bowls. I spend more time with animals than with my wife.

It gets better. I also spend each day at the shelter with great staff and volunteers – kindred spirits bound together with an abiding love for animals.

But there is heartbreak and frustration here as well as joy. Heartbreak over the deplorable condition of some of the animals that we rescue. Heartbreak over the Charlie Brown's Christmas Tree cat or dog that languishes for months or even years without being adopted. Black cats and dogs especially are prone to this fate. Frustration over having to maintain a long waiting list for persons who want to surrender a pet to us, because we don't have the space to accept more animals. (Although our shelter looks large, only about half of it has been finished on the interior because we lack the funds to provide the lights, heat, plumbing, etc. that are necessary to make it safe and habitable.) Frustration over paying many hard-working, dedicated staff members far less than they deserve. Any management expert will tell you that your employees are your most important asset, from whom you get your best ideas. Attracting and retaining good employees is a constant struggle. Many donors restrict the use of funds to "bricks and mortar", which of course is essential, but equally important are the personnel who can make it work, who can synthesize everything into a successful arrangement that achieves our mission. A corps of volunteers is important, but well-trained, experienced staff are critical, and staff turnover is costly to any organization, whether for profit or non-profit. Many of these paid staff positions are dangerous. Animal attacks upon our staff have caused scars, disfigurement and permanent nerve damage. Not all of the animals here are fresh out of someone's cushy living room. They have been abused, tortured, and starved, and have suffered all manner of emotional and physical stress. Their recovery and eventual adoption requires the skilled attention of paid staff who are

working for minimum wage while trying to raise a family and have a life.

Our two humane agents are good examples of this. We would like to have three or more. A humane agency and its agents are responsible for enforcing the criminal laws of Ohio against animal abuse and neglect. Some of the persons we encounter are well-meaning hoarders whose lives spun out of control. Others are vicious killers. Virtually every serial killer has a history of animal abuse. Animal abusers often are also spouse abusers, and child abusers. The link between animal abuse and domestic violence is well-proven. So the detection and apprehension of these persons can save the lives of people, too - not just animals. This is why I am not bashful about asking for donations, not just to paint walls and add more cages, but to buy equipment, pay for ongoing training for our technicians, agents and other staff, educate the public, and attract and retain persons who are very skilled at handling highly stressed, institutionalized animals so that they can be made adoptable.

One of our board members says that we are on the verge of greatness. I agree. Please join us in our crusade to make the Animal Welfare League of Trumbull County the premier animal shelter and humane agency in northeast Ohio and western Pennsylvania. Hell – how about in all of Ohio.

While the need for foster homes is year around, it is particularly necessary this time of year, as we near the end of kitten season. Currently our shelter is in the greatest need for cat and kitten



foster homes. AWL at times receives nursing mother cats as well as orphaned baby kittens.

Our foster volunteers are essential in keeping these animals healthy and thriving by taking them out of the shelter environment and into their homes temporarily. The length of time cats and kittens need in a foster home depends on their age and condition but is usually about two to eight weeks as kittens need to be healthy and a minimum of 2.5 pounds before they can be spayed or neutered. AWL takes

responsibility for all veterinary care and can provide the basic needs of care. By becoming a foster, you can help these homeless cats and kittens in need by housing and caring for them until they are healthy enough to be placed up for adoption and find their permanent homes. animals. With unique markings and luminous yellow eyes Granny would be a beautiful addition to any kind of home. Come witness the charm and elegance of Granny for yourself.




ASHTON

Pet Awareness Calasses

As you walk down the ramp at the shelter, you might notice the AWL Mission Statement right on the wall. It says. "Our Mission...Rescue, Rehabilitate, Adopt and Educate".

The Pet Awareness Classes "educate" the participants! To date, almost 2000 students from preschool through 8th grade have experienced the age-appropriate program. The younger groups enjoy the Pup Club while the older groups follow the Member Club curriculum. Within the 45-minute session, students learn basic pet care knowledge, dog bite prevention skills, awareness of dog body language, and safety procedures to follow around all dogs including service dogs and strange dogs. It is never too early to teach students about being responsible and nurturing pet owners.

To date, close to 400 participants 9th grade through adults have gained valuable information from the Leader 1 curriculum which includes specific steps to follow for dog bites and prevention, insurance coverage, local pet ownership requirements, and hot topics including euthanasia, say/neuter benefits, etc.

To experience a PAC program, contact the Education Coordinator, Mrs. Karen France, a retired teacher, by calling the AWL. Class Groups, Scout groups, 4-H groups, and any interested groups can participate in a PAC program at any location or at the shelter. With a portable program that includes Alpha, the stuffed animal mascot dog, Mrs. France is available to go to schools, preschools, meetings, etc. to educate all interested participants who receive a coloring book, workbook, or pamphlet to remember the important
