

SAYING GOODBYE TO THE GROTH CATS

It is not often that AWL has long-term residents who stay with us at the shelter. On average, cats come and go from the shelter in about 35 days, and dogs are moving onto their forever homes in 45 days. There are always exceptions to this. Tonka (dog) was at AWL three times from 2012 to 2022. The last time staying for 425 days before being transferred to another

animal shelter and being adopted just a week later. Pudding (kitten) came in August 2022 and was with AWL for 231 days before being adopted in March of this year.



Over the months and years, Little Tyke, Mulligan and Grover won over the hearts of AWL staff and volunteers. Going from scared, feisty, and sometimes a little bit angry, to running to greet visitors for pets and of course treats! After about two years with AWL, it was apparent that between age (all three were well over 10 years old) and health concerns, the three would spend the remainder of their lives with AWL.

Between December of 2022 and June of 2023, all three beloved senior cats crossed over the rainbow bridge. Tearful staff, volunteers, and Tom Groth said their goodbye as each one's time came. Their names are often spoken in the halls of AWL. Their paw prints still grace the desks and walls of many staff offices -- reminding us how lucky we were to be caretakers for these spicy, full-of-personality cats during their last years. Thank you, Tom, for entrusting us with your feline family.

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AN APPEAL FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT

Dear Friends and Supporters,

Since the early days of the COVID crisis, we've been inundated by a remarkable number of animals that have come into our care. Starting in March of 2020, we've taken in over 1,726 dogs, 2,434 cats and several other species like 16 rabbits, 25 guinea pigs, 223 farm animals and the like. If you can think of any type of domestic animal, chances are many have passed through our doors in the last few years. And there seems to be no slow down.

What's caused this? Frankly, it's a dramatic increase in the commitment we've made in answering, investigating and removing animals from inhumane conditions. Our team of three humane officers work tirelessly each day. They are truly special. They go into homes not fit for man nor beast. Often finding dead or dying cats, dogs and other pets mired in unthinkable conditions. Read the newspaper, follow local television and social media posts and you'll see the outcome of their investigations.

As a result, 51% of our intakes are now directly tied to the care of these "humane case" animals. Many of these animals require additional medical care before they can be released into our internal population, and then often require additional time and TLC before they can be adopted. As you can imagine, the costs are significant and are further compounded by the legal expenses involved in prosecuting the offenders.

That's where my request for your help comes in. We need your financial support. Pure and simple. We receive no funds—zero, zip, zilch—from any source other than compassionate donors like you.


The really good news is that your support will have an immediate and positive effect. We will be able to continue to promptly answer the almost constant need to investigate humane cases, rescue animals from miserable conditions, provide medical care, save lives and, ultimately help get these animals to the loving homes they deserve.



Meet Nakia!




Intake 9/9/22

Meet Tia!




Intake 2/3/23

Meet Dolly!




Intake 2/10/23

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Trap, Neuter, Return (TNR) is solution to cat overpopulation problem

TNR stands for Trap, Neuter, Return. Outdoor "community cats" are trapped, taken to a clinic to be spayed or neutered (surgical procedure where an animal is sterilized so it cannot reproduce), vaccinated for rabies, and released back to where it was found. "Community cats" refers to both stray (abandoned/lost, socialized) and adult feral cats (untamed) living outside.

It's true that outdoor cats have a higher likelihood to face problems that indoor cats don't. However, community cats have learned to live outside and fend for themselves. They can still live long, healthy lives.


It would be ideal for all cats to be born with the opportunity to be placed in a home and loved by suitable caretakers. But since we're already in a position where community cats exist, what can we do to work toward this vision? The answer is spay/neuter, and educate others about the importance of TNR.

TNR IS THE SOLUTION

Cats reproduce rapidly starting at just 6 months old! They'll mate with any male cat and usually have between 2-3 litters of kittens each year with approx. 4-6 kittens per litter. That's 18 new kittens that will also start reproducing in just 6 months! Female cats can continue to reproduce their entire lives.

There are likely hundreds of thousands of community cats in Trumbull County, and millions state-wide. TNR addresses many problems related to the community cat overpopulation problem:

- Animal Shelter Capacity Shelters reach capacity because unsterilized community cats reproduce rapidly. Approximately 80% of kittens surrendered to shelters are birthed by community cats. When community cats are fixed, shelters can free up resources to help other animals.
- Nuisance Behaviors Unsterilized cats wander, spray to mark their territory, and fight and yowl at night. Fixing them tends to reduce or eliminate these issues.
- The Unethical Alternative TNR is an ethical (and effective) solution to alternative methods of addressing overpopulation. Unfortunately, there are still people who shoot, poison, or otherwise kill cats, which is illegal, unethical, and ineffective. There's also trap-kill efforts where community cats are mass-euthanized. But neither of these methods fix the overpopulation problem, because of something called the vacuum effect.
- The Vacuum Effect Research shows that when community cats are removed from a neighborhood, this opens up resources for new cats to move in. Unsterilized newcomers will produce larger litters with a higher survival rate because there are resources available to sustain this. TNR is the solution because returned cats will continue to utilize the available resources without making more cats! It's very important to return cats to the area they're familiar with and gives them a higher chance for survival.



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TNR studies show it eliminates new cats from being born in an area in a few years, and decreases the population substantially (20-60%) in under 10 years.

Both male and female community cats need to be sterilized. Any cat without an ear tip that doesn't belong to anyone in the neighborhood should be trapped and taken to a TNR clinic.

What seems like a small dent actually makes a huge difference!

If everyone felt it wasn't their responsibility to TNR, imagine how many more cats would be running around! Anyone can contribute to TNR efforts. If you find you can't directly TNR, either educate others about the importance of spay/neuter and TNR, or find an organization doing it and support them.



TNR cats receive an ear-tip during surgery so they can be identified as spayed/neutered.














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












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EMPLOYEESPOTLIGHT

She said ever since she was a little girl, she knew she wanted to be a humane law enforcement officer, and after keeping an eye out for a job opportunity, she was lucky to be hired at AWL!

Let's get to know Chele a little better:

What do you like most about the work you do here?

AWL has provided me an opportunity to be able to make an impact. I have worked in the animal field for over ten years and I have always wanted to be the one out in the field responding to reports of animal cruelty and neglect that come in. What I like most about the work I do here getting to fulfill my sense of purpose.

Do you have any pets / how many came from AWL?

I have one cat. She is an 11-year-old black domestic shorthair and her name is Zucchini. I adopted her from AWL about two years ago. She came from a hoarding case that our department handled.






